Dear Commissioner Hespe,

In 1997, three long standing trends identified in Red Bank public school education drove the founding of Red Bank Charter School. Students repeatedly performed poorly on state assessments. They were disengaged or "disenfranchised" from their community. The schools were segregated, failing to reflect the diverse school age population of the children of the borough. Seventeen years later, Red Bank Charter School has done its' part to reverse these patterns.

RBCS is an academically high performing Tier 1 school. Students are vested, visible, and well appreciated by stakeholders as contributing young citizens in their town. The diverse student body and strong school culture provides an optimal environment for learning and social development.

Despite these accomplishments, we acknowledge that the landscape of public education in Red Bank remains largely status quo. While one of the best charter schools in the state, we are also one of the smallest. Our small size hampers the impact we can have as an agent for change.

We propose that by providing greater access to quality public school education, Red Bank Charter School could influence a substantial shift to higher achievement for a significant number of the children of Red Bank.

The Board of Trustees of the Red Bank Charter School respectfully requests an amendment to our charter, to expand from 1 class to 2 classes at each grade level, Pre-K through 8, with 20 students in each class for a total enrollment of 400 students. This increased enrollment would be implemented through a weighted admissions lottery. If approved, a phased implementation plan will begin with grades Pre-K-4 in 2016-17,

grades 5-6 added in 2017-18 and grades 7-8 added in 2018-19, respectively. This grade clustering pattern replicates our current instructional model.

Teacher culture is a strong component of RBCS success. In staffing the expansion, we will continue the teacher adjunct model to maximize opportunities for differentiated instruction. We will actively recruit teachers that fit the RBCS teacher profile. We cultivate teachers as specialists in their content area while encouraging participation in our distributed leadership model.

In the following document we provide all the required elements for amendment review. RBCS demonstrates evidence of consistent high academic performance, enrollment to capacity, robust wait list, fiscal stability, sound governance, stable school leadership, low faculty turnover, minimal student attrition and an available, affordable satellite facility to accommodate the expanded enrollment.

Red Bank Charter School is an example of a stellar stand-alone charter school, one that provided the backbone of the charter school movement in New Jersey. Our multi-dimensional, cohesive model for educational reform works. We are positioned and able to take it to scale.

We anticipate the public discord this proposal will generate. We are committed to refocusing the education discussion in Red Bank from the distractions of Common Core and PARCC back to outcomes and student achievement.

We anticipate the argument over the difference between the populations served by the Borough and Charter schools. We purport that the expansion and weighted lottery will convert to access and equity for a larger number of economically disadvantaged children.

We have examined the impact this expansion will have on the budget of the borough schools. We realize financial hardship will be incurred as RBCS likewise struggles under the New Jersey charter funding formula.

Acknowledging the weightiness of each of these factors, we respectfully submit that the determinant of this decision should not be political, demographic or financial. The decision must be grounded in the education and well-being of the children of Red Bank.




Academic Performance




Breaking out ELA and Math, our most recent 2014 NJASK performance shows:

Over a 5 year period, RBCS surpasses the state proficiency rates in ELA and Mathematics:




Academic District Comparative


In doing a comparative of the RBCS data profile to that of Red Bank Borough Schools, the differential between the two is significant. These findings are the underpinnings of the petition to expand Red Bank Charter School.

STARS Challenge

Noteworthy is the number of students that participate in the local competitive STARS Challenge science enrichment program. The goal of the program is to cultivate students who can become innovators involved in science and technology and ultimate maintain America's historical lead in technology and innovation through a focus on real-world problems and innovative solutions.

RBCS is proud to be a founding school with 6 of the original participants. Early on, we appreciated the value of the integrated discovery based approach to learning which we now term STEM. Over 10 years, 55 RBCS students have taken 124 courses. Commendable is the fact that students who participate travel to Monmouth University to take class at night extending their school day well beyond the 8 hours they spend at RBCS.

Enrollment

Family Demand-Wait List

Red Bank Charter School consistently has a robust waiting list with applicants at each grade level. The average number of applicants over the last 5 years, from 2011 to current is 98. We continuously backfill seats as they become available. There are no parameters or restrictions based on time of year or grade level. It should be noted that typically there is very little mobility from the wait list.

Family Preference for Choice

It is significant to examine the number of families exercising the option for school choice rather than attend the borough public school. For the 2013 school year, the data indicates that more than a third of students in Red Bank would choose a school other than the traditional borough school.

Minimum Attrition Rate

Another indicator of high parent/student satisfaction is the attrition rate. Over the past 5 years, as recorded in NJSMART, most students who transfer out, move out of district or out of state.

Demographics

As documented in the original charter of 1998, Red Bank Charter School was established to serve the school aged children of the town.

The admissions policy of Red Bank Charter School corresponds to the Charter School Act, 18A:36A-8e. It states, "The admission policy of the charter school, shall to the maximum extent practicable, seek the enrollment of a cross section of the community's school age population including racial and academic factors."

A common misunderstanding is that RBCS should mirror the population of the borough schools. To do that, however, would violate the very tennent on which the charter school was founded. Furthermore, it would compound the pre-existing long standing condition of segregation of schools in Red Bank. We hold that the success of RBCS is largely due to the integration and rich diversity of the school student body.

The demographic data below was used to examine Red Bank Charter School's status on this condition.

A comparative of RBCS 2013 enrollment data to this census validates that Red Bank Charter School substantially meets this mandate.

Further examination of this census data indicates that in Red Bank, 26% of children under 18 are below the poverty level. The DOE uses free and reduced lunch status to define economic disadvantage. While not a direct correlation, over the past 5 years approximately 40% of our students qualify for free/reduced lunch.

Contributing factors to this deviation are the small sample size, open admission policy, the sibling policy and the random lottery system.

RBCS is committed to the larger mission of changing the landscape of public education for the town. We are, therefore, proposing a shift to a weighted lottery system that will allow us to sustain our diverse school culture while educating more economically disadvantaged children.

For the 3 years of expansion, Red Bank Charter School is requesting to use the weighted lottery by proposing the following mechanisms to increase an economically disadvantaged student's chance at a seat. Any child who can provide proof of one of the following would get his or her name placed into the lottery (3) three times, rather than (2) twice:

- · Lives in Red Bank public housing;
- · Lives in Red Bank Section 8 housing;
- Child or guardian qualifies for SNAP/TANF benefits or
- Child already qualifies for free or reduced price lunch in his/her current public school.

Location/Facility

Red Bank Charter School will expand the use of our current satellite campus at 135 Monmouth Street. The building provides ample instructional space, is handicapped accessible with an elevator, and provides sufficient parking to meet the town ordinance.

The satellite campus will continue to house a STEM lab and performance space along with 10 classrooms, and a large multi-purpose room/gym. Previously, we never had a gym and have had to rent space. This building would also provide the opportunity to have a gym eliminating transportation and rental costs.

The proximity to our 58 Oakland Street building is approximately 9 feet off of the back of the property line allowing for a connected campus. The building is easily accessible, and students can walk back and forth between buildings requiring no transportation.

Per the projected calculations of State and Local Aid received per pupil, Red Bank Charter School will see a positive fiscal impact as a result of increased enrollment. Due to well maintained fixed costs associated with operating a school, i.e. administration, insurance, support staff, etc., RBCS is in a financial position to seamlessly transition to a larger enrollment. Furthermore, with the increased revenue as a result of this expansion, the school will be well-poised to maintain a leased or purchased facility.

Fiscal Impact

The anticipated financial impact of having this amendment granted will be a greater surplus amount. Surplus will be used to properly maintain our 100 year old existing buildings and new facility sites. While an increase in students may result in a lower per pupil tuition, the economies of scale and fixed costs associated with school operations will prove this to be a fiscally prudent endeavor. Given the unbudgeted surplus already maintained by Red Bank Charter School, it will have sufficient funds to reconfigure leased or purchased space to meet the educational standards equal or better to those required by the Department of Education.

Census Data Explanation

Each year the American Community Survey samples ~3.5 million addresses nationwide. While this is a substantial number of addresses, it is still insufficient to accurately report data for small areas. To increase accuracy for these locations, the Census releases estimates using 1-year, 3- years and 5-years worth of data. Due to the size of Red Bank Borough, Red Bank is covered by an ACS 5-year estimated data set. A five year estimate is calculated using 60 months of Red Bank data. The Census data I provided was calculated using data collected from 2006-2010. 5-year estimates are more accurate than a single year "snapshot" data for small populations.

Because the data used to calculate the 5-year estimate is between 5 and 10 years old, if Borough demographics have been shifting, the estimated data may be slightly out of date. However, it is as close to current as we can get. Even though the most recent ACS 5-year estimates use data from 2009-2013, the latest 5-year estimate available for Red Bank Borough with racial/ethnic/economic demographics is 2006-2010.

Disclaimer. Census demographic data for Red Bank Borough provided in this application is based on the 2006-2010 American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year estimate. Census data regarding percent of students attending private school is based on the 2009-2013 American Community Survey (ACS) 5-year estimate. Five year estimates increase the statistical reliability of data with small sample sizes.

Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:11-2.3, Red Bank Charter School has successfully completed a rigorous review of its program and fiscal-related activities and academic performance.

It is my pleasure, therefore, to inform you that I am renewing the charter for the Red Bank Charter School for another five-year term. This approval is based on the school's academic progress, the school's ongoing examination of its results to guide improvements and the commitment exhibited by the school's administration and board. I confirm the school's maximum approved enrollment, with expansion, is 200 students with 20 students at each grade level through 2016-2017 in accordance with the following configuration:

ADMISSIONS POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

In accordance with the charter, admission to the Red Bank Charter School is free and open to K-8 school age children who are residents of the Borough of Red Bank, regardless of creed, color, gender, national origin, religion, ancestry, race, sexual orientation, disability, or the need for special educational services.

Student Admissions Policy

By Resolution of the Board of Trustees, it is the policy of the Red Bank Charter School that, prior to a lottery, priority in enrollment of students shall be given to only the siblings of any student then enrolled who is a resident in Red Bank. It is further Policy that priority enrollment shall be given; first, to the sibling of any Charter School student then enrolled who is a resident of Red Bank; second, to any student who is a resident of Red Bank. Priority within each of the preceding categories following the lottery shall be determined in the order in which the applications are received. However, any student whose application is received after the 10th day of May of the year of enrollment, shall be enrolled, if space exists, or shall be placed on a waiting list in the order in which his/her application was received without regard to the Admissions Priority Policy set forth above.

Charter School Enrollment/Transfer Process

Red Bank resident student entering Red Bank Charter School:

- 1. Parent arrives at district school (Primary or Middle) and states that his/her child will be enrolled in the Red Bank Charter School (RBCS).
- 2. Primary School or Middle School office personnel
 - Obtains enrollment data: name, address, date of birth, name of parent(s), citizenship and sex of child (per NJAC 6:3-6.3).
 - Authenticates Red Bank residency (whatever documentation is customarily used for this purpose including possible use of Nancy Hooks).
 - Prepares transfer records (per NJAC 6:3-6.5(c.)10) and transmits same to Charter School Lead Person (per NJAC 6A11-4.2).
- 3. Charter School adds student to their enrollment with Primary School or Middle School designation.

Note: All Red Bank Charter School students who are residents of Red Bank are maintained on Red Bank Borough school district school registers but are identified as Charter School students.

Recruitment Policies and Practices

Student applications are accepted throughout the year, with special recruitment initiatives during the fall and winter. Recruitment activities include:

- Newspaper advertisements, press releases, school website, internet and social media announcements published in both English and Spanish.
- Outreach to Red Bank ministerium for inclusion in church bulletins. Congregations include the diverse populations of charter community.

- Posters in both English and Spanish displayed in various locations/businesses throughout town which service highest needs population of students.
- Large banner hung across main thoroughfare in neighborhood where the highest needs population reside.
- Advertisement for lottery in Red Bank town kiosk.
- Hosted a general informational "Charter Chat" with the principal for prospective families
- Offered tours to any prospective family.
- Letters to current families informing them of the lottery and applications distributed to RBCS families at LIP conferences.
- RBCS faculty liaison to the Hispanic Community makes targeted outreach efforts to the larger Latino community.
